



To represent and empower Illinois' SWCDs

proposed resolution to study SWCDs

What follows is the text of Senate Joint Resolution 107. Refer to the Executive Director's Notes, page 3 for more information.

SJR 107

WHEREAS, The General Assembly declares that, in order to conserve natural resources, control floods, prevent impairment of dams and reservoirs, assist in maintaining the navigability of rivers and harbors, conserve wildlife and forests, protect the tax base and public lands, and promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the people of this State, it is in the public interest to provide for the conservation of the State's soil, soil resources, water, and water resources in order to control and prevent soil erosion, prevent air and water pollution, and prevent soil erosion and floodwater and sediment damages; and

WHEREAS, Illinois Soil and Water Conservation Districts have been caring for the State's precious natural and environmental resources since 1938; and

WHEREAS, Soil and Water Conservation Districts have no authority to generate operating revenue through taxation but must rely on the Illinois General Assembly for their operational funds; and

WHEREAS, Funding levels have steadily fallen over the past several years to the level that many Soil and Water Conservation Districts have been forced to reduce employee hours, delay filling vacant positions, lay off employees, and significantly reduce natural resource and environmental protection services to Illinois citizens; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Illinois General Assembly shall convene a Joint Task Force on Soil and Water Conservation Districts, which shall study the history and purpose of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the administration and organization of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the current and future funding of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and any other topic regarding Soil and Water Conservation Districts that the Chair of the Task Force sees fit to study; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Joint Task Force shall include: one member appointed by the President of the Senate; one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; one member appointed by the Speaker of the House; one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House; the Director of Agriculture or his or her designee, who shall serve as the Chairperson; the Director of the Environmental Protection Agency or his or her designee; and the Director of Natural Resources or his or her designee; additionally, the Director of Agriculture shall appoint the following Task Force Members: one Soil and Water Conservation District

president's message

I was fortunate enough to be able to accompany some friends on a trip to the Middle East and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) in Early February. We went to visit our oil dollars and see what they have done for the people of that area. What I saw was an educational and eye opening experience. In Dubai especially, I noticed that there is construction occurring everywhere. It is easy to see how they got in the overextended situation they are currently in. If there was ever something that I would consider an expansion area it would be that area of the world. There are airports, office buildings, highways, banks, hotels, recreational facilities, restaurants and other supporting construction that is geared toward making the UAE a tourist destination and a world financial center. And, they are doing it with the dollars the oil importing countries pay them for their chief natural resource.

Prior to discovery of the vast oil reserves, the primary source of income was pearl diving and fishing. Most of the growth we observed has occurred since 1971 when the British relinquished control and turned the country over to the sultans.

The educational aspect of my visit was the fact that they know that they need to take advantage of their one major resource – oil, before it is depleted. They are working very hard to position themselves to become a world player before they run low on the petroleum products that are currently fueling their economy. I think there is a good lesson for us here. We need to be doing everything we can to reduce our reliance on imported fuels, keep our money at home and invest in renewable resources that will create jobs in America and help fuel our economy.

Soil and water conservation districts are uniquely positioned to help accomplish that end. As the local governmental unit working with landowners, you have the knowledge of

where the resources are, and how they might be able to be used to put the United States in the best possible position to become more self sufficient. One thing we have an abundance of that the Middle East does not have is fresh water. Much of the fresh water that is used in the UAE comes from desalination plants. Those plants use tremendous amounts of electricity to remove the salt and minerals from the waters of the Persian Gulf. They use oil to fuel the power plants to create the electricity and while the oil is relatively inexpensive there, the process to treat water to a potable form is not inexpensive.

SWCDs understand the value of protecting our water. Even though we have abundant supplies, we need to continue working to educate land owners of the importance of protecting our water and our soil resources. The programs that we administer or assist in administering make a huge difference in the long term productivity of our agricultural land and help provide food to feed our citizens and to help feed the rest of the world, something the United States seems able to do very well.

On another topic, we will be doing something different with the March Quarterly Board meeting. Instead of our usual practice of meeting at the Northfield Center, we will be having a conference call. We realize that there are certainly advantages to meeting face to face but, under the current financial constraints we feel this is in the best interests of stewardship and conservation of our limited financial resources.

We encourage all board members to participate and hope everyone will find this a workable solution to the alternative of prematurely using our available resources.

executive director's notes

As I write this, the sun is out, the snow is melting and it looks like it is going to be a beautiful day. I can't, however, say I am sad to see February go. It has been a very busy month and at times a very frustrating month. With little or no information forthcoming about when SWCD allocations will be paid, grim news on the 2011 state budget with its \$2 billion in reductions and more districts considering reductions in hours for staff, frustration levels have been high for many of us. I'm looking forward to a new month with hope that at least some things may improve.

There has been much discussion about issues that have arisen in the past few days and weeks. I will try to summarize some of that discussion and those issues here.

SJR 107 - The AISWCD approached Senator John Sullivan last fall with a funding proposal. We discussed the potential for getting legislation passed and he proposed a taskforce be created to provide recommendations to the General Assembly on SWCD funding issues. We had heard nothing until Tuesday February 23 when IDOA informed us they had received a draft resolution to form a taskforce to look at SWCD structure, activities, funding and anything else the task force chair determined to be in the interests of the task force. On Wednesday the Executive Committee held a conference call to review the proposed resolution and discussed several issues associated with the draft. Before we could provide comments, the draft was enrolled as Senate Joint Resolution (SJR)107 with Senator Mike Frerichs as the Sponsor. Senator Frerichs is the Senate Ag and Conservation Committee Chair. We have asked for a meeting with IDOA Director Tom Jennings to discuss his choices for persons to sit on the taskforce and to determine what input we may be able to offer.

SWCD FY 10 Allocations - AISWCD has been checking with the Comptroller's Office on a regular basis, at least every other week, to do what we can to elevate payment schedules. At the current rate that payments are being made, we anticipate that SWCDs will receive their first and second quarter allocation sometime in late April or early May. Two different sets of circumstances are slowing things down. Last year, the Comptroller was delaying Medicare payments and paying obligations where wages and salaries were involved. This year, federal stimulus money is tied to regular monthly Medicare payments and the second issue is that the state is now in the time frame where money borrowed last fall must be repaid to the tune of \$500 million per month.

We hope that there will be a short growth period in revenue in

early April as people pay their income taxes. If that is the case then there may be sufficient increases in revenue to catch up on some overdue bills.

The AISWCD has written letters to the Governor and to the Bureau of the Budget requesting immediate release of the third and fourth quarter funds so that IDOA can process those vouchers and get them in line at the Comptroller's Office.

FY11 State Budget - The FY 2011 budget that has been put on the Governor's Web site at www.budget.illinois.gov shows two items that we think may impact districts. Under special funds, Partners for Conservation (Pfc) shows an anticipated payout of \$9.789 million. It is unknown how much of that is intended for SWCDs since Pfc also provides funding for IDNR and IEPA programs. The Pfc fund is the source of CPP cost share funds and has been used to pay employee health insurance premiums for several years. The FY09 Budget Relief line shows no anticipated expenditures. That fund replaced \$3.5 million of Operations funds that Governor Blagojevich cut from the FY09 budget and was also used to fund SWCD Operations in FY10. If that money is not replaced by some means, SWCDs may receive that much less in FY11. We will not know general revenue funding levels for districts until the Governor releases his full budget proposal for FY11.

SWCD/NRCS Computers - The AISWCD has sought bids for computers and software to replace computers for which SWCDs chose not to pay the \$3,000 seat cost. To date, we have received one bid from Hewlett-Packard for hardware and one bid from Microsoft for software that seem to be really good deals. We have also been informed that SWCDs are in the agreement that NRCS has with ESRI for the GIS software and can have it loaded on a non-system computer at no cost. Please contact Jim at the AISWCD office if you are interested in taking advantage of this opportunity.

We have learned that computers for which the SWCDs choose not pay the seat cost must be removed by September 30, 2010. We interpret that to mean that ITS will be disconnecting computers from the system as early as April or May to allow sufficient time to achieve complete removal by the deadline date. Keep in mind that NRCS will continue to pay seat costs for one computer. For that computer there is no need to make any changes to current use.

Computers for districts (at a discount!)

It's really amazing how many twists and turns you go through when organizing a computer purchase with 98 diverse soil and water conservation districts in mind. What it all boils down to though is that we will soon have the ability to allow SWCDs to place an order through the AISWCD for:

Desktop towers come with a parts, labor, and onsite repair warrantee for three years. The notebooks only come with parts and labor but, that again, is for a three year period. All of the items are available without the purchase of a system. That means districts that are not going to buy hardware can still purchase Acrobat or MS Office Professional for the group rate! This is a huge savings over buying individually.

NRCS has stated that once they have SWCD board decisions on whether to pay the "seat fee" they will begin organizing removal of computers. It is expected that this process may take some time and could start as early as July. The earlier report I heard from NRCS of March or April turns out to be a little ambitious for IT and NRCS... thankfully!

I will reiterate that I have learned that SWCDs are included in the ESRI agreement for GIS software. This, as I understand it, means non-NRCS machines can have this software installed without an NRCS seat fee.

The AISWCD is still filling out applications, compiling documentation, and asking questions about HP products on behalf of the SWCDs. I really hope to have something ready by the first week in March. The plan right now is to send blank purchase orders (POs) to the SWCDs, have you fill out what you'd like to order, and send a copy of your order with an enclosed check for the total to the AISWCD office. We will compile the orders and send large groups of the orders to HP. HP will then ship your products to your individual district offices (not to the AISWCD). Software CDs will not be used for MS Office or Acrobat. Instead individual license numbers will be sent out and software can be downloaded off of their respective websites. This is actually preferable to purchasing a disk because the disks are not "supposed" to be transferable to another machine if the old one breaks down or is sold. With the license agreement the software can be transferred to another machine legally.

Please feel free to contact me if you have further questions on this process, software, or hardware. Again, I will try very hard to get this agreement together by March 5th.

Natural Area Guardians

Pheasants Forever Fest, 2010

The last week of February, a rare sunny and clear day in Des Moines Iowa, provided the setting for the 2010 Pheasants Forever Fest. The three-day event drew approximately 30,000 conservationists and sportsmen from around the Midwest. Pheasants Forever was first organized in Minnesota in 1982 in response to increasing concern with the loss of wildlife habitat.

Statistics for the current pheasant population keeps this concern very much alive. Iowa used to rank #2 in number of pheasants taken. In 2005, the number of pheasants taken by hunters in Iowa was 805,000. This figure dropped to less than 383,000 in 2008. The 2009 figure is estimated to be only 300,000. Severe weather, as well as loss of habitat, account for the decline. The quail population has also been the victim of decreased habitat.

In the past few years, the number of acres removed from the Conservation reserve Program would cover a strip of land 8 miles wide from Omaha to Davenport. This reminds one of the end of the Soil Bank Program in the 60s that resulted in a similar decline in the populations of pheasants and quail.

Former Governor of Iowa and current US Secretary of Agriculture, Tom Vilsack, was the main speaker at the Saturday noon luncheon at the PF Fest this year. Vilsack reported that the USDA Plans to allow landowners to enroll 300,000 additional acres to help pheasants, quail, and ducks. Beginning March 15th, these programs will be offered in the continuous CRP signup. The Secretary of Agriculture also signed an agreement to work with the Pheasants Forever and other groups dedicated to the preservation of wildlife habitat.

Today, Pheasants Forever has more than 125,000 members in over 600 chapters in the U.S. and Canada. As stewards of the land, Midwest farmers need to do their part in establishing and maintaining adequate habitat for wildlife.

legislative update

IAAP didn't have a report this month so we had a little extra space. We are including the current status for two bills that may be of interest to soil and water conservation districts

HB 4966

HB 4966, sponsored by Representative Chapin Rose, amends the Illinois Vehicle Code and the State Finance Act. A synopsis of the bill follows:

Provides for the issuance of Soil and Water Conservation District license plates and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital license plates. Provides that, in addition to the appropriate registration fees, an applicant for the special plate shall be charged a fee of \$40 at original issuance and \$27 at renewal. Provides that \$15 of the original issuance fee and \$2 of the renewal fee shall be deposited into the Secretary of State Special License Plate Fund. Provides that \$25 of the additional original issuance fee and the renewal fee shall be deposited into the Soil and Water Conservation District Fund or the St. Jude Children's Research Fund, new special funds in the State treasury. Provides that all money in the Soil and Water Conservation District Fund shall be used for grants to Illinois soil and water conservation districts for projects that conserve and restore soil and water in Illinois. Provides that all money in the St. Jude Children's Research Fund shall be used for grants to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital for pediatric treatment and research.

Status: Passed the House on 2/25/2010 with 102 yeas, 7 nays and 1present.

HB 6045

HB 6045, sponsored by Representative Dave Winters, amends the State Finance Act. A synopsis of the bill follows:

Provides that conservation practice cost-share grants from the Partners for Conservation Fund may be made to livestock operations for water quality protection and improvement.

If passed, the bill will become effective July 1, 2010.

Status: Assigned March 2, 2010 to the House State Government Administration Committee chaired by Representative Jack Franks.
